The goals of the minor are to foster greater knowledge of Latin American and the Caribbean and to explore the cultural contributions of the area to the global community.

To earn a minor, you need 15-20 credits (5 courses).

Students will complete the minor by taking courses on Latin American and Caribbean in at least two different departments, or for more breadth, by choosing courses in several departments and by fulfilling a language requirement. Spanish and French are considered the two main languages, but other native languages (e.g., Quechua, Maya, and Aymara) or Portuguese may be considered, though not offered at Ithaca College. The specific courses are selected according to the students' interests from a list of approved by the Latin American faculty. A total of six transfer credits may be used towards the LACS minor as well as six credits from another minor. Students pursuing a minor in Latin American Studies are encouraged to study abroad.
