Explores the diversity of the world's societies, including "primitive" hunter-gatherer societies, herding pastoralists, peasant agriculturalists, and industrial peoples in rural and urban places. It emphasizes the role of culture in shaping human adaptations and human actions, and promotes understanding of other cultures. This course examines the way anthropologists do fieldwork, and looks at the contributions anthropology can make to an understanding of modernization, social change, urbanization, race relations, and cross-cultural communication. Reflecting the research experiences of individual professors, different sections of this course emphasize different cultures or regions of the world. 3 credits. (F-S,Y)

ANTH 22000 - Southeast Asia: Its Peoples and Cultures LA SS

Focuses on the peoples of mainland and island Southeast Asia. First, students study how these peoples developed their present-day patterns and cultures. Then, they deal with the modern complexities of life in the pluralistic societies of mainland Southeast Asia. The conflicting values of upland and lowland peoples in their struggle for a share of resources in a rapidly urbanizing situation are discussed, as are the many Western influences on the East and vice versa. Prerequisites: ANTH 10400 or ANTH 12900. 3 credits. (IRR)

Prerequisite – this means that completion of a specific course is required before enrollment is possible.

Note the level of this course. It is a 200-level course as denoted by the numbering of the course. It is typical that courses above the 100 level have prerequisites.

This course is not offered each year; it is the case that it might be offered every other year.
