

# **Song for Lyndsay**

It is always an honor when a friend asks me to compose a work for his or her ensemble, but the significance is even greater when that friend is a composer and conductor that I admire. When lack Stamp asked me to compose a work for the Symphony Band at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, it was understandably important to me to compose something special, something that would have meaning for both lack and me. I hope I have succeeded. Song for Lyndsay is a very personal work, with a great deal of meaning to me, but ideally with some significance for Jack and his ensemble as well. The musical materials for the work are mostly derived from a short piano piece that I wrote for my wife, Lyndsay, in 2005. Although the structure of the work is much more complex than its forerunner, Song for Lyndsay is still more than anything else a simple love song dedicated to Lyndsay and what she has meant in my life.

## **Three London Miniatures**

If I had to select a 'favorite' foreign city, London – with its warm people, unique urban charm, and rich historic and cultural traditions – would certainly rank at the very top. While all of the musical arts thrive in that fascinating city, the majestic and dignified traditions associated with English choral singing in particular, are especially impressive and memorable to experience. Westminster Hymn centers around a sturdy hymn tune having a decidedly Anglican flavor. Intermittent brass fanfares represent the regal and ceremonial traditions of Westminster Abbey. For England's Rose is an expressive, lyrical tribute to the late Princess Diana (1961-1997). Kensington

## **Fortress**

Fortress was composed as a tribute to the composer's former band director, Robert Floyd, and the Berkner High School Band of Richardson, Texas. Although Ticheli was already an international award winner, this was his first published work for concert band. The first 19 measures of Fortress are taken from the composer's piano score for a 1987 theater production of Moliere's Don Juan. Of the dozens of short snips, each of which portrays a different character, this passage represents the dual personality of Don Alonso – on the one hand, chivalrous and honor bound; on the other hand, sinister and ruthless.

# The Black Horse Troop

Sousa was an inveterate sportsman, and he loved horses – in spite of a permanent arm injury suffered in a fall from a high-spirited steed named Patrician charley in 1921. Only three

years later he wrote *The Black Horse Troop March*, dedicating it to Troop A of the Cleveland National Guard. Years before, in 1881, he had marched with his U.S. Marine Band and the same mounted troop in the funeral procession for President Garfield. When Sousa and his band premiered this march in Cleveland in 1925, the troopers rode their beautiful black horses right up on the stage with the band.
