EDINBURGH, SCOTLAND

Since August 2000, Ithaca College students, most of them heading to London for the fall semester, have made a short trip to Edinburgh, Scotland. August is festival season in Edinburgh. The highly acclaimed Edinburgh International Festival brings world-class theatre, opera, dance, and music to Edinburgh. During the first year

of the festival in 1947, eight groups of performers showed up uninvited and performed anyway. These unsolicited performances continued until 1958 when the festival fringe society was created. The Fringe Festival Edinburgh is now considered the largest arts festival in the world.

The Edinburgh Book Festival, which began in 1983, is now a key event during festival time in Edinburgh. An important feature of the Edinburgh Book Festival's program is its high-profile debates and discussion series. Each year writers from all over the world gather to become part of this unique forum in which audience and author meet to exchange thoughts and opinions on some of the world's most pressing issues. Founded in 2004, the Edinburgh Art Festival is Scotland's largest annual celebration of visual art. The art festival offers a distinctive opportunity to experience the best of contemporary Scottish artists in the context of exhibitions of the most important international artists and movements of the 20th century and other historical periods.

THE CITY OF EDINBURGH

Edinburgh is an amazing city divided into two main areas: Old Town and New Town.

The medieval Old Town straddles the volcanic ridge between Edinburgh Castle and Holyrood Palace. Original habitation of Old Town dates to the Bronze Age, and the road that developed from the ridge to the palace, known as the Royal Mile, developed quickly and with little space to grow out, so it grew up. Aspects of this medieval tenement are still intact today and an inspiring part of the city.

The New Town to the north evolved after 1757, when wealthy merchants drained the marshy area and expanded the city beyond the medieval walls. This new town was called the Athens of the North, and the inhabitants embraced and fostered all things intellectual and educated. New Town contains Britain's finest concentration of Georgian architecture.

Old Town and New Town are divided by Princes Street, the city's biggest thoroughfare and commercial center, which is close to many of the city's museums and galleries and is where the train from London stops. Spend three full days exploring this magical city seeing some significant sights through a bus tour, a walking tour, and visits to the castle and museums. Take in the many festivals that make the city come to life in August with world-class theatre, opera, music, literature, art, and performance. Traverse the Royal Mile, hike Arthur's Seat, and see the views of the city from Calton Hill. Experience a culture rich with traditions, stories, and history, and partake in the culinary delights such as deep fried Mars bars and haggis! For J.K. Rowling fans, see where the first and last Harry Potter books were penned, Platform Nine and Three-Quarters, and the inspiration for Hogwarts.
